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APRIL 2015

To the Honorable Board Members of the Ohio Commission on Hispanic/Latino Affairs

The commission's activity on the month of April focused primarily on the implementation of the Minority Health Month Workshops, the Hispanic Women's Conference and preparations to host the 2015 Legislative Visit Day.

Through the four minority health workshops, we were able to reach 100 community leaders and connected with 29 health care experts who delivered more than 14 different presentations on critical health related topics for our Latino community. Three out of the four sessions were offered all in Spanish which provided the opportunity to reach a more targeted audience. Additionally, OCHLA distributed hundreds of pieces of informational materials to all conference participants and obtained critical feedback from the workshops on how the Latino population in Ohio is accessing health services, what are some of the major challenges they face, and which best practices are making a difference for the population. A detailed report on the workshops is included on the Organizations Development Center Report, and a final report on the grant will be presented to the Minority Health Commission and the OCHLA Board next month.

In April, the commission partnered with Amanecer, a Hispanic serving organization in Columbus to host the 2015 Hispanic Women's Conference. The main objective of the Hispanic Women's Conference was to build capacity, leadership and provide information on government and community resources that can help women empower themselves.

We know that US Hispanic women have recently and rapidly surfaced as prominent contributors to the educational, economic and cultural wellbeing of not only their own community, but of American society and the consumer marketplace. The rise of Latinas is expanding not only their purchasing power, but also their ability to shift to the ambicultural middle – embracing



both their Latin roots and the American language and culture as well (Latina Power Shift, The Nielsen Company, 2013.) Ohio Latinas are part of this critical national mass and OCHLA wants to make sure we are building and strengthening them, so they can not only function well in society but rise to new opportunities.

The conference was delivered completely in Spanish and brought together women from Toledo, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Dayton and Columbus with an attendance of 280 participants. The 2015 Hispanic Women's Conference included a Community and Services Expo with twenty five presenters; there were also thirteen expert speakers/presenters and six afternoon workshops and a keynote conference. More details on the conference are included in the Organizations Development Center section of this monthly report.

In the area of Workforce and Economic Development, the commission focused this month on the Hispanic Chambers of Commerce. We organized, prepared and staffed the quarterly meeting of these important chambers representing Cincinnati, Dayton, Columbus, Toledo, Cleveland and Canton. The agenda included updates from each chamber, a presentation on the use and role of lobbying and its potential to move forward the economic agenda of Latino businesses in Ohio, an update on the Hispanic Legislative Day, a presentation on the Ohio Export Internship Program (Development Services Agency), and a discussion on best practices. The agenda for the meeting is included with this report. The next meeting will take place in Dayton during the month of June.

Additionally, ODC Officer Georgina Alvarez and Director Cavanaugh have been in conversations with the National Council of La Raza (NCLR) to discuss how more Ohio Hispanic organizations may be able to learn and gain access to NCLR's programs, including economic and workforce, education, health and empowerment programs. We will continue to work on this long term project and maintain the board informed. Furthermore, the letter of intent between Adelante Inc. and El Barrio in Cleveland to consider the project of starting a workforce development program in Toledo is being reviewed by both parties and we hope will soon be finalized, thus potentially increasing the ability to train more Hispanics in Toledo for the marketplace.

In the area of Latino organizations empowerment, Director Cavanaugh has been working with Allen Proctor to plan the webinar on Social Enterprise, Fundraising and Sustainability. The plan is to conduct a Webinar in early June and a workshop with organizations staff before the end of the month.

Director Cavanaugh met with Mr. Jeremy Gutierrez, from Huntington Bank, who recently was elected to the Governor's Minority Development Financing Advisory Board. This is a very important board tasked with creating employment opportunities in the minority business community. The purpose of the meeting was to provide an overview of the commission, our workforce and economic development agenda, and to provide an overview of the situation of Latinos in Ohio.

Finally, Director Cavanaugh and Chair Michael Florez had a conference call with Mr. Gus Hoyas to discuss minority vendor opportunities in regards to the Ohio Department of Transportation projects and the concern regarding the representation of Hispanic contractors.

The majority of April was spent preparing for the Commission’s annual Legislative Visit Day. Legislative Visit Day brings Ohio Latinos and state legislators together to foster dialogue and familiarity on the challenges and opportunities facing the Hispanic community. It is the Public Policy Center’s largest event of the year. A large portion of the month was also spent engaging Legislative offices; it is critical for the Commission to maintain an open line of communication with Ohio’s state legislators.

Grants Management and Implementation— Minority Health Month

Steady progress is being made for grants MHM 05-15 and MGS 03-15. The Minority Health Month Workshops have been implemented during the month of April; some of the workshops have had the language access and cultural competence component as well.

Through the four workshops conducted in April, we had the participation of 29 expert health professionals who presented to their respective local audiences. We also had 100 local participants in the workshops. Although general parameters were provided regarding the curriculum, each workshop was customized to meet the specific priorities of the community. By adapting the curriculum to local needs and selecting local health experts to conduct the training, we expect to enhance capacity building at the local level and strengthen important local relationships thus creating sustainability. Furthermore, three of the four workshops were offered completely in Spanish to make sure the training would be able to tap an audience that is most often closer to the Latino community and may not feel as comfortable attending seminars in English. (The Cleveland workshop was conducted in English by request.)


Hispanic Women’s Conference “ Princesas Guerreras”, April 11, 2015

The Latino Affairs Commission partnered with Amanecer, a Hispanic serving organization in Columbus, to deliver the 2015 Hispanic Women’s Conference in Columbus.

The Hispanic Women’s Conference was born out of the need to provide Latina women with the opportunity to begin an integral transformation process in their own language and with a program that clearly meets the unique needs of their community. The conference offered tools to deal with self-discovery, improvement plans, information on how to function in the United States and how to work through the barriers of integration, language issues and culture.

Additionally, through a series of workshops participants received critical information regarding government and community services, resources and other means to help them become functional and active participants of society. In summary, the conference sought to work with Latina women to overcome the challenge of feeling transient - a foreigner - and to move towards their full inclusion into their communities and our society.

The conference presented all in Spanish brought together women from Toledo, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Dayton and Columbus with an attendance of 280 participants. The conference included a Community and Services Expo with twenty five presenters; there were also thirteen expert speakers/ presenters and six afternoon workshops and a keynote conference.
