Summit Executive Summary

The 7th Ohio Latino Health Summit took place on July 28, 2017. The summit was hosted by the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine and our five Partners LULAC Ohio, The Ohio Commission on Minority Health, Closing the Health Gap, Mercy Health and Proctor & Gamble. The Summit was held at the University of Cincinnati Medical Center in their Medical Sciences building and Kresge Auditorium. The many areas of the building were used for the exhibitors area and the registration desk.

This year's theme was "Integrate – Educate – Empower" which covered three general main Areas: (1) Healthcare workforce and resource development, (2) Navigating the healthcare system, and (3) Behavioral and mental health. A big emphasis was made on a "Call to action" which allowed the opportunity to continue the work started at the summit in the form of three mini grants and the 1st Medical student Hispanic Scholarship in the health field was set in place in collaboration with LULAC Ohio. In addition the 1st Ohio Latino Health Summit Champion of the year was awarded.

The primary highlight of the summit was our prestigious keynote, Dr. Antonia Coello Novello, 14th Surgeon General of the United States that presented a wonderful and motivational overview of Latino Health across the country. Our 6 year partner LULAC was key in obtaining her presence and participation.

The 2017 Summit offered different learning environments for the audience, including three plenary sessions, six workshops, and a keynote. Ample networking opportunities were built into the event, together with thirty-four Exhibitors, which offered local and state resources along with the opportunity to enhance relationships between partners and participants.

Approximately 250 attendees, exhibitors, and contributors participated in the event, representing five major counties: Butler, Cuyahoga, Franklin, Hamilton, and Lucas county and three states: Ohio, Illinois, and Kentucky.

14th Surgeon General of the United States

“In Health and Life Hispanics are more than Statistics”

Dr. Antonia Coello Novello was sworn in on March 9, 1990 to serve as the 14th Surgeon General of the U.S. Public Health Service. Her appointment marked two firsts: Dr. Novello became the first woman and the first Hispanic ever to hold this position. As Surgeon General, Dr. Novello spoke to our audience on health matters such as smoking, AIDS, diet and nutrition, environmental health hazards and the importance of immunization and disease prevention., violence and spear-heading efforts for national legislation.

Without a doubt, the crowing highlight of the summit was Dr. Novello that with her overview of Latino Health across the country, her lessons learned while serving as Surgeon General and her perspective on how Latinos must play an active role in organizing and increasing community responsibility to improve health practices. It culminated onto the “Call for Action” and theme of our conference to “Integrate * Educate * Empower” that created a sense of inspiration with such motivational sensation that produced a standing ovation from the complete body of the participants for Dr. Novello words and inspiration. “Community-Partnered Approaches to Latino Health in Cincinnati” Presentation

The presentations included two examples of collaboration between community and academic partners that improves the health of Latinos in Cincinnati. First, Dr. Jacquez from the University of Cincinnati and Dr. Vaughn from Cincinnati Children’s Hospital and presented their work with Latino immigrants as research partners providing a community-based, peer-delivered stress and coping intervention. Secondly, Anna Straus, Manoj Ambalavanan, Chad Stephens, and Caroline Hensley presented the University of Cincinnati’s Student-Run Free Clinic, a partnership between medical students, academic researchers, and The Healing Center, a not-for-profit faith based organization that aims to offer practical, social and spiritual support for both individuals and families, largely of (though not prohibited to) the Latino community .




2017 Latino Health Summit By the Numbers

The 2017 Ohio Latino Health Summit was made possible by our Host the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine and our Partners LULAC Ohio, The Ohio Commission on Minority Health, Closing the Health Gap, Mercy Health and Procter & Gamble.

Through these collaborative efforts in coordination with our wonderful keynote Dr. Antonia Novello, over 250 participants, 26 contributors, 34 exhibitors from 16 total counties, 3 states and gathered to learn about healthcare workforce and resource development, navigating the healthcare system, and behavioral and mental health in our community.



Feedback and Next Steps

Overall, our Ohio Latino Affairs Commission received commendations for an excellent job in bringing together over 250 participants, and in the logistics with registration and all logistics for the executing of the 2017 Ohio Latino Health Summit (“the Summit”). We have outlined some of the areas discussed with our staff, steering committee and partners as follows:

ACHIEVEMENTS:

Increased collaboration

The University of Cincinnati College of Medicine and Mercy Hospital collaborated with our agency to host the event. Our planning committee consisted of a broad collaboration between health professionals, clinicians, and Latino leaders resulting in a strong alliance among different sectors of the SW Ohio community that understood the needs of the community.

Cultural competence

These topics were included in all sessions, providing healthcare professionals from different backgrounds a broader understanding of the Hispanic community throughout our state. Networking opportunities enhanced dialogue among health care experts, social service providers, and Latino leaders.

High participants’ satisfaction

Over 85% of participants surveyed responded positively about their experience at the Summit. One participant commented, “All of the data was very informative and very well displayed,” while another commenter stated, “There was nothing that was unhelpful/irrelevant.”

Best attended sessions

The top three attended sessions were:

- 2) "Training the next generation: Developing a health care workforce to serve Latino populations in the future".

IMPROVEMENT AREAS

Handouts and materials

Participants requested the availability of more power point presentations as handouts to follow during the presentations.

Support team and volunteers

The team performed well in registration and traffic flow for the summit; however, more details regarding parking alternatives (due to traffic and construction) was requested.

Networking

A suggestion was made to host a summit topic-related networking activity or a small event for participants to meet, and emphasize the importance of keeping the focus of healthcare on the Latino population.
